Approaching a new year calls for reflection upon the one just passed. Time spent serving the Lord on many fronts has made this year a very busy one for most of us. Early in 2011 we realized the need to produce a new and more capable missionary boat that will be better equipped for service in a wide range of seas and at the same time, more economical to operate. Within nine months, April to December, the vision of having such a ship is quickly becoming reality. The coming year will be a hallmark year for our ministry in the Philippines with the completion of the new motor-sailing ship, **MSV RIM Nativa II** by the end of 2012. We embrace the challenge of both its construction and its use with eager anticipation!



Lying to the west of the Zamboanga Peninsula of Mindanao is the Sulu Sea at the edge of which is the western Philippine island of Palawan. For many years we have had a desire to visit that area but for various reasons have not been able to do so. Bounded by the South China Sea along its western coast are many very remote villages in what truly is a wild frontier of the Philippines. Working in this area is an objective of Remote Island Ministries once the new sailing vessel is completed. Over the coming months we will be focusing our prayer attention on this goal. Thank you for joining us!

Many of you who read this newsletter have contributed generously to this project through the past nine months. We thank you so very much for your help. At this writing there remains a financial need amounting to approximately \$100,000 to complete the ship by the end of 2012. We're prayerful for the Lord's continual supply month to month so that we may keep the shipyard on schedule with the work. It is difficult to adequately express our appreciation to all who share in the ministry of World-wide Literature and Missionary Supply. Calvary Baptist Church, Hamburg, Arkansas and Brother Joel Meredith, pictured at the right, lead the ministry and together with volunteers from various churches throughout the area, labor diligently to keep the work moving forward.

On December 6th we shipped two more forty-foot units laden with more than 80,000 pounds of Bibles, Sunday School and Vacation Bible School materials, tools and various pieces of equipment needed by the churches, our seminary and Remote Island Ministries.



The projected arrival date of these containers in Davao City is January 26th. By that time we will be ready to unload and begin immediately using the great supply provided for our year of ministry.

This and several other vital pieces of equipment for the new ship are now on the way to the Philippines. Growing up in the Arkansas River delta gave me an opportunity early to learn about farming procedures. Rice was one of the main products of our area, planted in flooded fields by airplanes. How different rice production is in the Philippines where it is sowed in small nursery plots then transplanted one sprig at a time in the large fields! Every single seedling is purposely set by the planter resulting in long, straight rows on beautiful terraces. Although the work is difficult and time-consuming, it assures that every rice plant will produce and be harvested.

A missionary's work is much the same. The usual manner is small-scale...one-to-one planting of God's Word, nurturing, encouraging and often guarding against destructive forces that would ruin the hopeful harvest. The time-consuming labor is difficult and in some cases, dangerous but as we see it, there is no other way to get the job done. The fields of souls are numerous, in fact, more than can be counted and so we and others carry on, ever on and on.
